SAILABILITY SPOTLIGHT

Tiring, Exhilarating, and Fun!

In October Sailability took part in the Hansa World Championships in Portimão, Portugal, including physically and intellectually disabled sailors plus a support personnel of parents, helpers, and coaches the team numbered 9 sailors, 1 coach and 6 helpers.

Sean Purdie and Alison Cook travelled with Sean's son Leo Purdie and saw a sailing Championship up close for the first time. Leo has autism, has competed in the 24-hour Charity Race and Barts Bash and often sails with Sailability on Saturdays.

On returning to Hong Kong, they penned a thank you letter, describing their experiences in Portimão and laying out clearly the positive impact that taking part in a major international sailing event had on their son:



"Dear Sailability Hong Kong,

We would like to thank your organisation for facilitating Leo's participation in the Hansa World Championships in Portimão in October 2023.

Leo benefited immeasurably from the week (as well as from his Europe holiday either side of the event!). The challenges he overcame during the actual sailing have boosted his self-confidence hugely; the sailors at times faced very difficult weather conditions, with high waves that Leo and his sailing partner Joel had previously not encountered in Hong Kong.

Even with sailing during heavy rain, and water collecting in his boat, Leo was willing to repeat races in such conditions. And despite becoming physically tired over the course of the week, he remained happy and eager to sail in every race possible. Moreover, he understood very well the purpose of the races and was keen to perform to his very best.

The championships as a whole were fully inclusive, and Leo further benefited from competing with sailors of very varying physical and mental abilities, as well as those with no such handicap.

He appeared to understand that he was sharing the experience with those with greater challenges than his own, and that other sailors have also overcome tremendous barriers to participating in the sport. Certainly, as supporters, it was incredibly humbling to see competitors who were quadriplegic, paraplegic, blind and missing limbs.

Aside from the actual racing, the event as a whole was a wonderful experience for Leo. The camaraderie amongst the sailors and their support teams from various countries was great to be a part of. Each morning there was an interactive whole group meeting in which the day's races were discussed and any questions answered. The Hong Kong contingent then conducted their own meeting, from which Leo and Joel benefited greatly from the technical knowledge and experience of both Ed and Kay.

Each evening, the tired but exhilarated sailors and their support network joined in a fun social event, ranging from Karaoke to live bands with wheelchair dancing. The coming together of people with differing needs and languages (or no language) was a new experience for Leo, and one that will be very memorable as he looks back on all the photos of the week. Not only did Leo's sailing skills and self-esteem increase from all the races and expert support, he benefited from this very inclusive social experience.

Lastly, immense thanks must be given to both Kay and Ed, without whom Sailability Hong Kong could not have been represented in Portimão. They ensured everything ran smoothly, despite last minute changes due to weather conditions etc, and were available 24/7 with updates and to answer our queries. Thank you does not do them justice!

We very much hope that there will be future world sailing competitions in which Leo can participate, as the growth we have noted in him since Portimão is wonderful.

When we got back to shore, with the boats stored away safely, I discovered that my phone wouldn't work and I had to replace it. That was quite a memorable day for me! Some of my favourite moments have been when one of the instructors, like Jesse (Lam), have told me I'm making good progress."

Always keen to learn, Ah Kai is now progressing from Hansa 303's to sailing a Hansa Liberty.


So, it's never too late to learn, and never too late to start something new.

In October 2022 Ah Kai joined a group from the Sham Shui Po Kai Fong Association which had arranged a day sailing at HHYC with Sailability. Ah Kai enjoyed it so much, he kept coming back and joined Sailability as a volunteer.

He had no experience of sailing prior to this, meaning he literally started sailing at the age of 76! He's learned how to sail a dinghy, he can rig a boat, and he loves helping others. Although he's only been sailing just over a year there are many people on Sailability programmes with less experience than he now has.

"I've learned a lot from the instructors", said Ah Kai, "and have made many friends during the last year with Sailability. There is a good mood among the people here, it feels great to be involved."





And whisper it quietly, in a few days' time it will be Ah Kai's 78th birthday!

Participants were from three HK schools – TWGHS Tsui Ting Tong, Hong Chi Winifred Mary Cheng Morning Hope, and CCC Mongkok Church Kai Oi School.

Sailability provided 14 Hansa 303 dinghies for the races, while families viewed the action from onboard Hebe One. Overall, there were 4 races, and some of the less experienced sailors in the group initially found the wind conditions challenging.

After lunch, Treats awarded certificates to all those who participated, plus prizes for the best sailors.







On behalf of Sailability HK, Kay Rawbone received a certificate of appreciation from TREATS, and the two Sailability Lead Instructors on the TREATS programme also received a gift as a token of thanks for their hard work. CLOSING EVENT OF THE YEAR

BARTS BASH - A DAY OF DRAMA! 16TH DECMEBER 2023



It was a day of drama at the Hong Kong Christmas Barts Bash! This charity fundraising event was postponed from September to 16 December only for bad weather to feature again.

Race officials took the decision to abandon the morning race for safety reasons after the 40 boats taking part had arrived at the start area. Para Sailor Sylvia Leung agreed with the decision saying, "not only was it very windy, but the waves were coming directly at us sitting low down in our boats." Instructor Jesse Lam said, "some of the sailors have not previously experienced conditions like those and were not enjoying the experience."





For the afternoon, to enable sailing to take place in calmer waters nearer to Hebe Haven the race was split into 2 fleets- one for HHYC and one for Sailability. The Sailability fleet included fourteen Hansa 303's, three Hansa Liberty's, three 2.4mR's plus four safety boats.

In the Sailability races there was more drama when the main mast on a Hansa 303 snapped into two! A safety boat was alongside within seconds to assist the two people on board. The racing continued and some competitive battles took place in the windy conditions. By the end of the afternoon, more than one boat crew reported torn sails but everyone was safe and smiling very happily back at the clubhouse.


